CHAPTER 1

Discussion Questions:

1. How did Kat get her unfortunate nickname?

Have you ever been given a nickname?

If so, what was it, and how did it make you feel?

2. Why did Kat feel that she was just average?

3. How did Kat plan to reinvent herself?

4. How do you think Kat felt when she wasn't chosen for the part of Mary?

5. Kat thinks the pageant was rigged. What do you think, and why?

6. Who taught Gram about the wonders of cinnamon?

Activities:

Create a family tree for Kat McGee. Include her grandparents, parents, brothers and sisters, and pets.

Kat's brothers and sisters say and do some very hurtful things to her, when they could have supported their sister. Write a paragraph explaining why it is so important to support your siblings and closest friends, especially when they are going through difficult times. Give examples of how you can show your support.

Use the instructions below to make your very own, original snow globe.

YOU'LL NEED: Small clean jar with a lid (baby food or condiment jars are good choices) A piece of sandpaper Small plastic figures or waterproof decorative objects that will fit in the jar Hot glue gun or super glue Distilled or bottled water Glycerin (available at drug stores or craft stores) Glitter Colored electrical tape (optional)

1.Remove the lid from the jar and lightly sand the inside of the top.

- 2. Position figures on the lid.
- 3. Glue in place. Let dry.
- 4. Fill jar about 7/8 full with water. Add 3-4 drops of glycerin.
- 5. Add 2-3 teaspoons of glitter.
- 6. Close jar.
- 7. Glue closed or seal with electrical tape.
- 8. Lightly shake and smile.

Activities:

The School of Christmas Spirit educated some of the finest world leaders: Martin Luther King, Jr., Mother Theresa, and Barry Manilow. Research each of these leaders and list 5 things that they did to impact the world.

Draw a picture of the Earth, and illustrate what you think the North Pole and the "S" word look like, based on the information in this chapter. Include as many details as you can.

Discussion Questions:

1. On the way to Nicholas Hall, Kat talked with her new friends Jackson and Jillian, who each envied something that she had. What did they envy, and why?

2. Why did Kat admire Mrs. Claus so much?

3. According to Mrs. Claus, what is the definition of **worthiness**?

4. What is The Photo Booth of Potential?

5. What did The Photo Booth of Potential tell Kat about her future?

Activities:

Create your own candyfruit. Combine your favorite fruit and your favorite candy and list the vitamins and benefits that it possesses, just as Chip did when he was serving Kat breakfast. Design your own packaging and present it to your class, or family.

Follow the recipe in the back of the book to bake the original candyfruit served to Kat in the North Pole.

Discussion Questions:

1. How do you think Kat felt when she pressed the "X" button for her own brother, Abe?

3. According to Mr. Nickel, why did Kat pass the Tenet of Wisdom?

4. Use context clues to write the definition for the word **wisdom**.

Activities:

Kat didn't think it was fair to label people based on a ten-second video, and stood up for what she believed in. Choose something that you have observed in your life (at home, at school, or elsewhere) that you don't think is fair. Write an argument for why it isn't fair, and create a new system, or approach, that would make it fair.

Discussion Questions:

1. According to Mrs. Claus, what does the word **wonder** mean?

2. What mistake led Gram to create one of her most delicious meals?

3. Do you think there is something wrong with Santa, and do you think he will be okay?

4. What do you predict will happen in the next chapter?

Activities:

Design your own Christmas cookie. Follow Mrs. Claus' instructions on page 48.

Discussion Questions:

1. What is inside building ABCD?

2. According to Mrs. Claus, what is the definition of the word **whimsy**?

3. The Whimsy Elf concluded his presentation by saying, "Now, boys and girls, always continue dreaming and exploring, creating and innovating. For the magic of toys is the magic of the imagination." What do you think this means?

4. Would you want to receive a Blob over a boomerang, or a stuffed animal? Why, or why not?

Activities:

Kat donated her leftover Salted Cinna-Water-Nana cookies to the "Save the North Pole Penguin" food bank. Research local charities, and choose one that you would like to donate to.

Choose a toy, or design your own, that reflects your unique personality. Present it to your class, or family, and explain why you chose that particular toy.


Vocabulary List: mentor, innate, reluctantly

Discussion Questions:

6. Why do you think Scoogie would do all of the mean things that are discovered in Chapter 8?

Activities:

When studying the reindeer, Kat realized that each had unique strengths and differences that made the entire pack stronger. Study your family, record each family member's strengths and differences, and describe how these strengths and differences make your family stronger.
